## **6 КЛАСС**

### **ЦЕЛИ УРОКА:**

**Образовательная:** развитие навыков устной речи по теме, активизация в речи учащихся лексических единиц и отработка использования предлогов времени

**Познавательная:** расширение и углубление культурологических знаний

**Развивающая:** развитие навыков языковой догадки, реакции, памяти, внимания, мышления

**Воспитательная:** формирование уважительного отношения к языку, расширение кругозора, умения активно и плодотворно работать в коллективе

**Тип урока:** урок обобщающего повторения

**Оснащение урока:** мультимедийное оборудование, компьютер, раздаточный материал

### **ХОД УРОКА**

1. **Организационный момент.** Приветствие учащихся, создание эмоционального настроя

Good morning. Nice to meet you! How are you? Sit down, please. What date is it today? What is the weather like today? I think that the weather is not so bad today. And how are you today? I'm very glad to hear that you are OK today. Let's begin our lesson.

What will we talk today? Let's take envelopes with №1 and take out some cards with letters. Your task will be to make words.

Can you tell me the words? (**tradition, holiday, festival**) Great! So today we will talk about British tradition, holiday, festival.

2. **Фонетическая зарядка.**

Let's play the game snowball, but instead of snow we will use the names of holidays. Every team will say one the same phrase "People like to celebrate ..."

and you should to make the sentence longer. *People like to celebrate Christmas and New Year. (Easter u m.ð.)* That was great! You know a lot of holidays.

Take the envelope number 2. Now we will listen to four texts and match them with the names of the holidays.

### 4. Развитие навыков работы с неподготовленным текстом.

This holiday means spring, new life after winter, flowers, green trees. What holiday is it? You are right. Easter. Let's learn more British Easter tradition. We will take the envelope number 3 and take out the texts. Each group will read only one text and match it with its title.

Read the texts (1—3) and match them with their titles (a—d). There is one title you don't have to use.

- a) This Race<sup>1</sup> Is Not for Young Children
- b) Don't Want to Eat Them? Roll<sup>2</sup> Them
- c) Easter Symbols in Britain and the USA
- d) American Easter Tradition



1. British children know what presents they will get on Easter Sunday. Their parents, grandparents, sisters and brothers give them chocolate eggs. It's a tradition. Sometimes children don't eat their Easter presents but roll them downhill. It is a tradition too. For example, every Easter Monday, which is a holiday in Britain, children living in Preston come to Avenham Park and roll eggs there. They use not only chocolate but also real eggs and even oranges in this unusual race.
2. In the United States the Easter Egg Roll began in 1814. Dolley Madison, the wife of President James Madison, invited a lot of children to come and take part in the new game. The Egg Roll is a race in which children push<sup>3</sup> an egg through the grass with a kind of long

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spoon. The race takes place near the White House every Easter Monday.

3. Cheese-rolling is more dangerous than rolling eggs. Sometimes the cheeses are very heavy — three kilograms or more. Cheese-rolling happens on the eighth day after Easter. The players send cheeses rolling down the hill and run after them. The first person to get to the foot of the hill is the winner. People believe that this tradition is about 500 years old.
